

A Report to the Georgia Agricultural Commodity Commission for Peanuts on University of Georgia Cooperative Extension County Agent Programs

Funding was provided for 2015-2016 from the Georgia Peanut Commission to support peanut related programming by University of Georgia Cooperative Extension County Extension Agents. The funding was utilized to support four specific programs. Those programs were:

- 1) County Extension Agent travel to the annual meeting of the American Peanut Research and Education Society (APRES)
- 2) On-Farm Applied Research and Demonstrations
- 3) The Georgia Association of County Agricultural Agents (GACAA) Peanut Education for Excellence program
- 4) Printing of the 2013 Georgia Peanut Production Update guide

County Extension Agent travel to the APRES meeting – Nine University of Georgia County Extension Agents representing peanut producing counties in Georgia were selected to attend the 2015 American Peanut Research and Education Society (APRES) annual meeting held July 14-16 at Charleston, SC. The GPC provided funding to cover travel to the meeting for 4 of the 9 county agents.

The Georgia Peanut Commission has sponsored agents' attendance at this meeting since 1988. Membership and attendance at the annual meeting is comprised of all segments of the peanut industry, with the majority of the membership being research and extension scientists from universities and USDA in the USA peanut producing belt. The annual meeting is a forum for scientific paper presentations and poster sessions. Papers are presented in the areas of production and agronomics, plant pathology, weed science, entomology, economics, food science and utilization, breeding and genetics, physiology, and extension techniques.

The APRES meeting is an outstanding venue for county extension agents from Georgia to learn the latest in production technologies. The agents can then take the information that is presented and incorporate it into their local county's production system in order to increase profit potential. The APRES meeting also provides county extension agents an opportunity to present data from their own applied research trials and demonstrations. They can also highlight a successful extension program on peanuts in their county. The county agents also have the opportunity to interact with scientists and extension agents from other peanut producing states. Many times an idea shared among colleagues is what leads to a new and profitable production practice being incorporated into a county's production system.

All University of Georgia county extension agents are in the Public Service promotion system and are required to show participation (presenting papers or posters) at a professional society meeting. The APRES meeting is one of the few professional society meetings that gives agents that opportunity. The Georgia Peanut Commission is to be commended for their financial support of county extension agents for attending and participating in this meeting.

County Extension Agents from Georgia attending the 2015 APRES meeting in Georgia and funded by the GPC were: David Shane Curry, Brock Ward, Nick McGhee and Brian Hayes.

On-Farm Applied Research and Demonstrations – County Extension Agents in 10 counties received funding support of \$500 each to conduct on-farm applied research and demonstrations in peanut production. These County Agents conducted trials in the areas of cultivar evaluation, disease management, and burrower bug management. Each of the County Agents will submit an individual report, as specified in the requirements for receiving the funds. The reports will be a part of the entire package of reports. Funding to support these county-based trials is extremely important as the County Agents demonstrate the most economically productive peanut production strategies for producers. Sincere appreciation is expressed to the GPC for their continuing support of these trials.

Georgia Association of County Agricultural Agents (GACAA) Peanut Education for Excellence program – Each year the GPC provides \$2,550 in funding to support the GACAA awards program for excellence in peanut programming at the county level. In 2015, four County Extension Agents were recognized for outstanding programming in peanut production in their counties. The 2014 winners were: 1st Place – Bill Tyson, Bullock County (\$500 cash award) 2nd Place – Mark Crosby, Emanuel County (\$400 cash award) 3rd Place – Brock Ward, Miller County (\$300 cash award) 4th Place – Phillip Edwards, Irwin County (\$200 cash award)

Printing of the **2016 Georgia Peanut Production Update** – Funding in the amount of \$5,060 (2,300 copies at \$2.20 each) was allocated to cover the cost to print the 2015 Georgia Peanut Production Update, an annual production guide distributed to peanut producers during the winter meetings. The cost to print the 2,300 copies came to \$5,060. Prices have gone up for the 2016 version of the update. It was very much appreciated as it allowed us to print enough copies to put at least one copy in to each producer's hands during the winter peanut production meetings.
